Walking into 2017: New shoes for a new year

Due to the generosity of our members giving to our club's Foundation, 250 kids will be wearing new shoes as they go to school in 2017.

The Kiwanis shoe project started in 2006, as an idea of Dick Kern. He assigned Andrea Neese to this project when he was President, after hearing about it when he went to the International meeting. Although Andrea says "all the credit needs to go to him" for the shoe project, it would not have happened if she had not executed the idea so well for the last ten years.

When the project was discussed, it was agreed that it would serve elementary school children who are living in districts with the highest measured poverty rate. It has grown from a small number of pairs of shoes to about 250 pairs this year. As we heard from Dr. Contreras at the last meeting, the

schools feed about 65% of public school children, and in the poorest districts nearly all of the children come from families living in poverty.

This is how Andrea describes what she has to do to make this project a reality:

"We will donate about 230-240 pairs this year. Plus each school will get about 15 pairs for their "back stock" to use during the year for emergencies. It takes days and days to organize. I take the average of what we have done over the past two to three years and that is what I begin to buy in June and July. I contact the social workers in about July and remind them about the project. I take Brannock shoe size measuring devices to Bessemer Elementary School the first week of school and rely on the social worker to deliver them to Falkener when she is finished measuring her children. This year we have also added Cone Elementary to the mix. I start calling the social workers in September to encourage them to get the sizes to me. And call. And call. And call. I finally got the lists in November this year. So that means I will have about 250 pair of shoes in my living room/dining room for five months. Then, once I have the list, I make two nametags for each student. One goes on the bag of shoes for the

student and one goes in the envelope that goes to the homeroom to call the student to the cafeteria to come get the shoes. We then match the tag to the shoes. On the nametag are the child's name, the shoe size and the teacher's name. I then go to the shoes and find the child's size, put the shoes in a grocery bag and put the nametag on the bag. We used to just have the teachers send the students from the classes, but we have so many international students, we could not understand the student, so this way we simply match the nametag to the shoes. Then all the shoes will go in alphabetical order to make them easy to find.



Once we have all the shoes bagged and ready at my house, I ask for volunteers at the club meeting. Once the day picked by the school arrives I take the bagged shoes in my van. Our club volunteers and I unload and go to a classroom or the cafeteria, and then have the best fun giving each child their new pair of shoes. This year this was in mid-December, so just in time for Christmas and the 2017 winter months.

I have a budget of about \$2,500 each year, funded by the Kiwanis Foundation, which is now called the Kiwanis Children's Fund. Some years it will be a little less, and some years may be a little more. I buy the shoes from Ross and KMart. I try to watch for KMart to run their back-to-school sale when they are buy one pair and get one pair for \$1.00.

If you volunteer for this program once, you will come back again and again. The children are great and very appreciative. We also give them a pair of new socks with their shoes and they are very excited. It's really a good feeling to put a smile on their faces...especially the little ones. The hugs are worth it all."














Cake Pops, Golf Balls, Clothespins and Russian Tea
